WATER INTO WINE STORIES

Have an experience of God turning water into wine in your life? We would love to hear it!

Spend some time considering a story you'd like to share, write it out (about 350-500 words) and send it to Pastor Evan, or just ask to talk to him to craft it together.

The daily half-mile walk to the mailbox at the end of the lane wasn't so long on the October day the Sears Christmas catalog arrived in 1946. There was my dream again—this year featured on the front cover. It was a toy farm set, complete with cows, horses, pigs, chickens, sheep, a barn with doors that opened, a tractor and trailer, and even fences and people.

I wondered and yearned, "Is it possible that maybe this would be the year it would be under the cedar Christmas tree that Dad had chopped from the woods?'

But as so many years before, on Christmas morning the tree greeted me not with what I wanted, but with a practical flannel shirt, a thin coloring book, and a 1-row box of crayons. I so desperately wanted that farm set.

It wasn't until years later that I realized the difficulty and hardships my dear parents endured to make a living and rear three children in those waning Depression years.

Because I never received my Sears catalog farm, I decided to create my own boy-made farm on the back porch of our five-room unpainted house.

One of my evening chores was to shuck and shell enough corn for the chickens and pigs. I gathered the corn cobs ...

and placed them in the kindling box on the front porch to use for starting the kitchen cook stove and wood heater in the morning. My parents didn't mind when I asked to keep a few of the long, straight cobs. It was from those cobs that I made my farm.

A long white cob made an excellent horse. Every once in a while a cob would be red and white-an instant paint horse. Solid red cobs were always mules. A cob from a small ear of corn, or a "ubbin" as we called it, made a perfect colt. By snapping of a 2– or 3-inch piece off the tip of a cob, I could make a cow/calf pair that could always be matched by the break no matter how many cows and calves were on my make-believe farm. A third of a cob was a sow pig, and the remaining two-thirds section was chopped into little piglets-the tip always being the "runt" of the litter.

As the morning dew or occasional rain warped and bent the cob animals on the back porch, they would be "marketed" to the kindling box.

As I grew older, I graduated to hatching real chicks. But cows were my true love from the day Dad gave me my first heifer. I spent hours sitting on the cow-pen fence watching cows eating hay, chewing their cud, or licking their calves. And I always dreamed of owning my own farm.

Nearly 50 years passed before that dream came true. In 1994 my wife Sylvia and I purchased a small Texas farm and went to work turning dreams into reality. I took early retirement from my career in education. We began to live a

life that has been rewarding beyond expression. We sit on the front porch in the evening, tired and dusty from work but happy listening to the owls and the coyotes.

I thank God for the chance to turn my childhood imaginings into reality. Now I can share a life I so dearly loved with my children and grandchildren. Yes, I had a dream—and at last I'm living that dream on my very own "real" farm.

The Power of the Red Kettle



We all know the famous line: "every time a bell rings, an angel gets its wings!" That's taken, of course, from It's a Wonderful Life, a cinematic classic for this time of year. Truth be told: there is a lot of bell ringing in the month of December. Church handbell choirs....our own lofty church bells.....jingle bells on doorways and dog collars and Christmas decorations.

But for me....year after year....I find myself a little bit amazed by the volunteers who a) give up time during the busiest season of the year, b) stand outside in the coldest time of the year, and c) shake and shake and shake and shake their arm, ringing the little bell for the Salvation Army. I know it's simple. I know it's just pocket change usually. I know that they are so easy to overlook. But I am full of wonder when I see these people.



I didn't know where those funds go locally, and so I did a little research this month. It turns out every dime and penny collected

in Washington County, at the Brenham WalMart, goes to Faith Mission, and 100% of it is used to fund emergency requests for help with utilities and housing costs. 100%. Faith Mission keeps none of it. In Austin County, to my knowledge, there is no Salvation Army kettle collecting site (someone tell me if they know differently!). But hey—just a chance for one of us to get this started.

All this was started by one man in San Francisco in 1891, who wanted to raise funds to provide a holiday dinner for the poor. By 2018, the holiday Red Kettle campaign raised \$433.7 million for the Salvation Army to disperse. Turns out that handfuls of change and other gifts go a long way.

Reflections on the Habitat Trip to Beaumont Written by Donna Lankford

Our Thrivent Build team partnered with Habitat for Humanity of Jefferson County. To give a little history, 20% of Jefferson County was living below the poverty line in 2016. Then, they saw great devastation when Hurricane Harvey dumped 60" of rain in 5 days. Hurricane Harvey damaged more than 110,000 homes in Jefferson and surrounding counties with an estimated \$125 billion in damages and took the lives of 19 people. Surprisingly, the many refineries in the area contributed very little towards rebuilding the community. Many of the donations come from outside the community or local businesses. Lots to build on are usually gifted through the city or inheritance and much of the labor, such as our team, is volunteer.

I really love Habitat's motto...they provide a hand up, not a hand out. Each home is sold without profit and has an interest free mortgage. Partner families contribute 300 hours of "sweat equity" by helping in the construction of their own homes and homes of other partner families. Eleanor Frank will be the recipient of the home we worked on. Eleanor, her son, and her autistic grandson will be living in the home. She was a reserved lady but appreciative of our time and labor. On Friday, several of her other grandchildren came to see the progress and we were excited to learn that one of her grandsons is a regular volunteer for Habitat.

On this build, we laid floors, cut and hung trim, hung doors and caulked. Pastor Evan came down on Thursday and helped lay floors. At the end of the day, he blessed the house. Before the trip, we were all asked to choose a word. Then, each night we had reflection and we were asked to share how we saw our word that day. Our words were: grateful, rewarding, fun, humility, serving, humble, finding and my word was kindness. I saw kindness throughout every day with simple gestures of "excuse me", "thank you", "beautiful job", never a harsh word or blame towards a job that someone had done before us or beside us.

If you have Facebook, then you noticed bobble head Jesus that Pastor Evan sent with us. Jesus was always with us whether in the middle of the dinner table as a bobble head (witnessing maybe a little too much fun), at the build or simply feeling his love and presence. I would also like to say "thank you" to the children for sending our care packages. We enjoyed the yummy snacks and left one of the crosses at the house for Mrs. Eleanor as a reminder of the love of God and the love we felt and shared during the week. It was a wonderful and rewarding experience to work together as a team to help a family and to do God's work!

ST PAUL PHILLIPSBURG UPDATES


